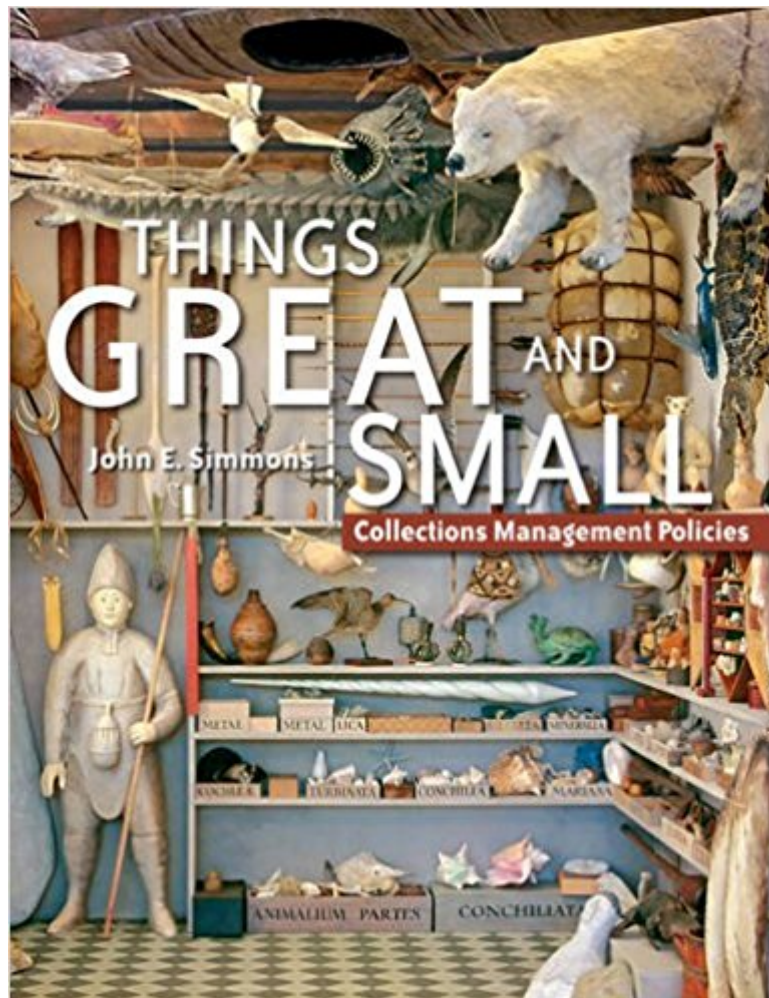


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# Things Great And Small: Collections Management Policies

While this book is a standard resource for most museum registrars, the Kindle version is absolutely useless as a reference. The ebook uses arbitrary "locations" instead of page numbers, so the index cannot be used at all. If you are planning to obtain this book for frequent work/school references, save yourself the headache and buy a physical copy until makes page numbers available in this ebook. Citations of quotes from this book are also impossible without the page numbers.

This book contains great content for developing and/or maintaining collection policies. It gives guidelines for creating and updating collection policies that is clear and straight to the point. To better clarify his point at the end of each chapter, the author lists multiple real-life examples of policies at work in a variety of different types of museums. Organizational tables containing the information presented in the chapters also help as a quick reference guide.

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
