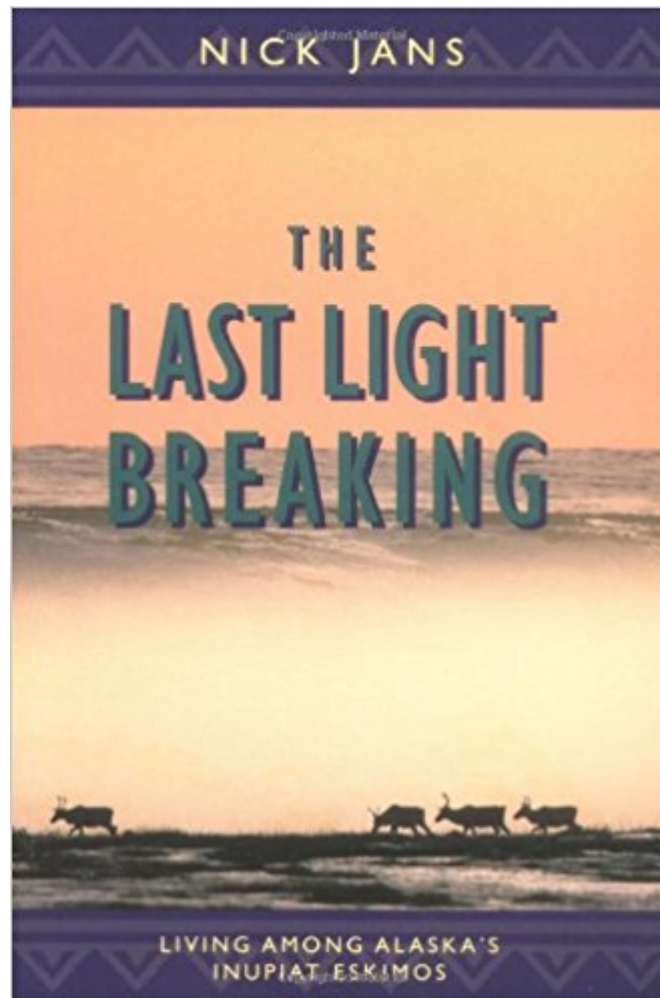




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# The Last Light Breaking: Living Among Alaska's Inupiat Eskimos

After 25 years I finally went back to University this year to complete an Anthropology Masters Program I started decades ago. I am focusing my thesis on the Inupiat in Anaktuvik Pass, Ak, and ordering as many books as I can on traditional Alaska. This book has a lot of anecdotal information even though it does not follow standard academic footnoting and sources. It is an excellent window into life in the northern regions of Alaska, and on the Inuit culture in general. Even if you are not in academia, but interested in how people survive in sub zero environments where they still rely on hunting caribou to exist, this is a good read. Not all of us choose to live in apartments and condos, and those who live in the Arctic tundra can teach most of us how to survive in a harsh region without modern conveniences. The book also deals with the loss of traditional values some of the small villages are facing now that snowmobiles have replaced dog teams and satellite TV and the internet are driving young people to cities never to return to their native villages. How did I enjoy reading *The Last Light Breaking*? First off, I looked for my map of Alaska. Where is Ambler? Where is the Kobuk river and Noatak Canyon? Where exactly is the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. I tried to imagine what it would be like to visit such a place and to experience the beauty of this untouched wilderness. What a thrill would it be to watch a migration of caribou, grizzlies fishing in ancient rivers, and wolves hunting? It is not a place to visit by me or others, I thought, as it would destroy one of the last wild places on earth. Modern man has already left his ugly footprint. Can the caribou still travel their age old migration routes in future years? Will the voices of wolves still echo in the tundra? Or will the arctic Alaskan wilderness be lost to exploration and exploitation? Nick Jans takes you on a journey you will not forget. The book is elegantly written and enlightening. It deserves more than 5 stars!
