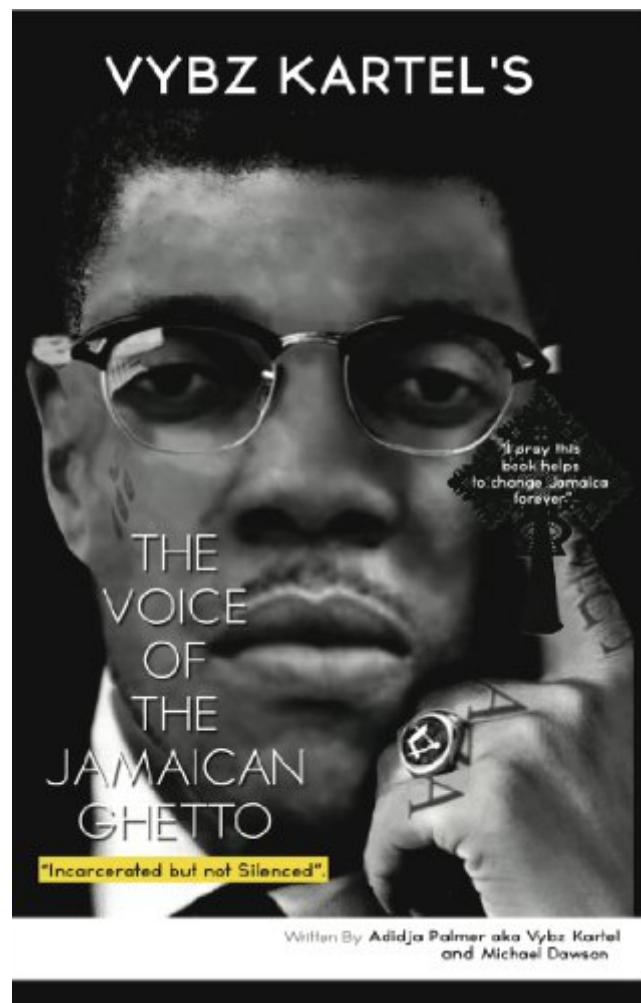

As a Peace Corps volunteer in an inner-city Kingston community from 2002-2004, I witnessed many of the issues that Kartel discusses firsthand. While Kartel points out the many ways in which the government, "society," and "Babylon," need to reform their ways, he also points out how inner-city residents themselves need to work as agents of change. I know very little about the conditions of Kartel's arrest and I'm not the biggest dancehall fan, but as a book that tackles the issues faced by the Jamaican ghetto this is an excellent read, and will hopefully be a call to action, especially for those at the highest levels of government and "society."
