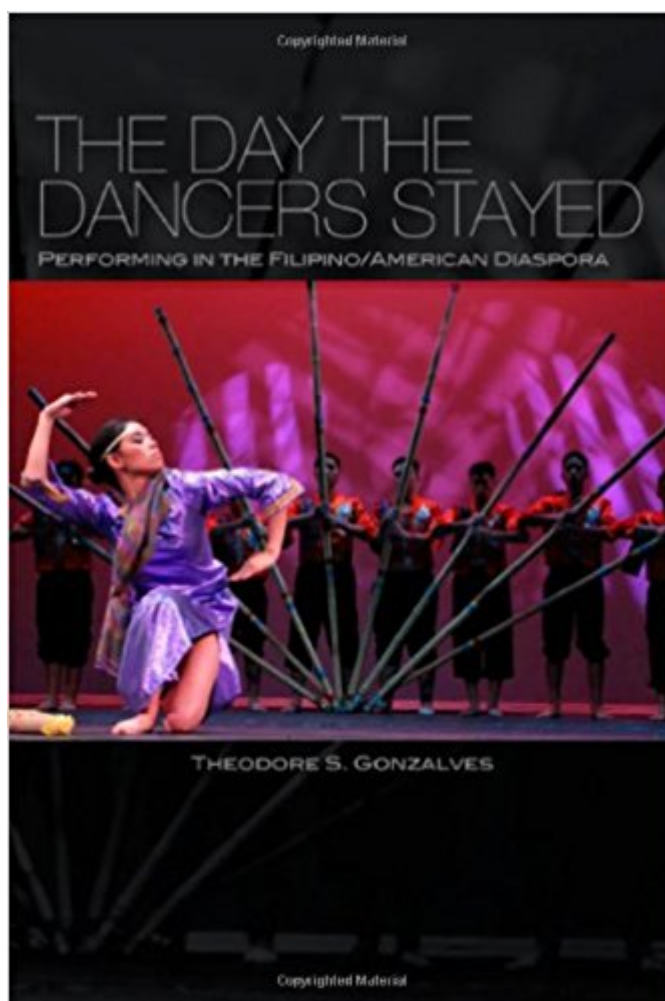


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# The Day The Dancers Stayed: Performing In The Filipino/American Diaspora
