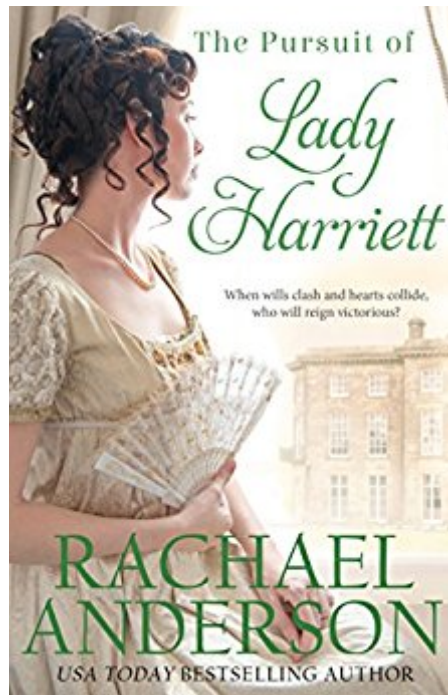




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The Pursuit Of Lady Harriett (Tanglewood Book 3)

I have very much enjoyed this whole series, and this book was no exception. The struggles in the relationship were realistic and did not feel artificially contrived. The series as a whole is well-written. Just as in the previous books, there is a great sense of humour running throughout. The book is romantic, yet clean and the religious themes are well integrated into the story and not overpowering. The author is able to keep the tone of the book appealing to a modern audience while still maintaining an acceptable level of authenticity. She has obviously done a great deal of research. It is a highly recommended read. There are a few nitpicking details that I noticed, but will likely be of little import to most readers. At that time, the children of the aristocracy and gentry were cared for by nurses and nursemaids... "Nanny" is a historically inaccurate title for this period, and became common decades later. Also, when I tried to find more information on the famous singer the characters were planning to see at the opera, the only famous singer of that name that I could find (an Italian castrato) died in 1782. Too early for this story by decades. (It sounds like I go looking for errors... I don't. I just read of a lot of history and am interested in the background information of stories.) As a general thought, when authors are writing stories set in Britain, especially historicals, I wish they would use the British spellings of words instead of the American ones. I find it a little distracting. That being said, I am nitpicking because this really was a great read and I suspect that most readers will not even notice the little details that caught my eye.

What an absolutely delightful, funny story. I have read all 3 of the Tanglewood books and each one has gotten better. I have had several laugh out loud moments in all of them, but this one was the funniest in my opinion. This is the story of Chris and Harriett who are both visiting dear friends that
